UNIVERSAL vs LOCAL FLOOD – GENESIS 6-9

Those who espouse the local only flood use the following ideas to maintain their view. (1) Modern geology shows an improbability of a universal flood. (2) Universal statements in the text are limited to the local area in which the flood took place.

The Extensive Language Says the Whole World was Covered. All Perished!

- The text never names a region that was flooded. God always calls it the "earth"
- (Ge.6:11-13,17; 7:6,10,12,14,17-19,21,24; 8:1,3,7,9,11,13-14,17,19,22; 9:1)
- God also uses broad language such as "the face of all the earth" (Ge.7:3-4,23; 8:8)

The Construction and Populating of the Ark was an Absurdity if the Flood was Local

- It was absurd to build a big box over 120 years to float thousands of animals in a local flood.
- God could have simply told Noah to get out of the valley as he told Lot to do.

After the Flood God Promised Never Again to Bring such Drowning Destruction (8:20-22)

- "I will never again destroy <u>every living thing</u>, as I have done" (Ge.8:21)
- "Never again shall <u>all flesh</u> be cut off by the waters of the flood" (Ge.9:11)
- "" "never again shall the water become a flood to <u>destroy all flesh</u>" (Ge.9:15)
- If that was a local flood then God didn't tell him the truth.
- Has there ever been another local flood? Of course. We read about them all the time, and people die in them.

Genesis Traces All the People in the World Back to Noah and his Family (Ge.9-10)

- In Genesis 9-10 the Lord starts to lay out the genealogy.
- They all come out of Noah's family.

When You Look at other Biblical References to the Flood, They Affirm, but Never deny, its Universality



- **Psalm 104:5-9**, The Psalmist speaks of the "foundations of the earth"; "waters stood above the mountains"; and the shorelines set to limit the water.
- 2 Peter 3:4-13, Peter uses the reality of the past global flood judgment to refer to a future global fire judgment.
