## THESSALONIAN "COMING" CONTEXT

1Th.1:10	We wait for Jesus who will deliver us from the wrath to come at the rapture.
1Th.2:19	This "coming" (parousia) is the rapture when we are present with Christ.
1Th.3:13	Paul prays that they are holy at the <b>coming (parousia)</b> of our Lord with all His saints. This is referring to the rapture of the church.
1Th.4:15	Those who have already died at Christ's <b>coming (parousia)</b> will be resurrected first, then those alive will be resurrected.
2Th.1:6-7	The Thessalonians endured much tribulation. The promise is that at the rapture, when Jesus is <b>revealed</b> ( <b>apokalupsis</b> , see 2Th.2:6,8) from heaven, believers will get their "rest".
2Th.2:1	Paul refers to the <b>coming</b> ( <b>parousia</b> ) of our Lord and our gathering to Him. These are two aspects of a single event as they are governed by a single Greek article.

**2Th.2:8** The antichrist will be destroyed when Jesus <u>comes (parousia)</u>. It will be at the brightness of his coming.

2Th.2:4

The antichrist will reveal himself when he sits in the Temple of God saying he is God. This occurs at the mid point of Daniel's 70th Week. Paul is saying this

## THESSALONIAN DAY OF THE LORDY CONTEXT

- 1Th.5:2-3 The Day of the Lord is associated with destruction. Unbelievers will say peace and safety, but will be caught when the DOTL arrives.
- **1Th.5:8-10** The wrath is associated with the DOTL. We have not been appointed to the DOTL wrath.
  - 1Th.5:23 Paul prays that they will be blameless at the <u>coming (parousia)</u> of Christ
  - 2Th.1:10 When Jesus comes it is associated with "that day" in context known as the DOTL.
    - 2Th.2:2 Were in the Day of Christ which they knew was associated with tribulation.
    - **2Th.2:3** Paul assures them the DOTL will not occur unless the falling away and the revealing of the man of sin happens.

## THESSALONIAN FIRIBULATION CONTEXT

1Th.1:6-7 The Thessalonians received <u>much affliction (thlipsis)</u> becoming a good example to other believers in the region.

1Th.2:14 As the <u>believers in Judea were persecuted</u>, so also were the <u>Thessalonians</u>.

1Th.3:3-5 Believers have been <u>appointed to "afflictions" (thlipsis)</u>, and will suffer "tribulation", and may be "tempted" if our faith wavers.

2Th.1:5-7 God counted the Thessalonians <u>worthy to suffer</u>, but <u>God will</u> repay "tribulation" (thlipsis) to those who persecute them, and give us "rest" at the rapture.

2Th.2:2-3 Many were <u>troubled</u> believing the Day of the Lord had come.
Paul tells them to <u>not be deceived</u>. Then Paul tells them of two <u>prerequisites that must occur first</u>.
